THE OHIO SPECIALIZED DOCKETS PRACTITIONER NETWORK

With over 100 specialized dockets in operation throughout Ohio, the Supreme Court of Ohio, the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and the Ohio Department of Mental Health have recognized the need for interaction among the professionals that staff these courts. In order to provide such a forum, the Ohio Specialized Docket Practitioner Network was created to provide peer support and technical assistance to these programs. The Network is comprised of several sub-networks that meet by discipline. These sub-network meetings allow specialized docket practitioners to discuss the challenges and successes they have faced in their specific role on the specialized docket court team. In addition, the sub-network meetings offer opportunities for specialized docket professionals to provide program updates, discuss program operations, and discover innovative and effective strategies employed by other specialized dockets. OUR VIEW ON CRIME AND PUNISHMENT: 'THERAPY WITH TEETH'

In the mid-1990s, Carson Fox was a prosecutor in conservative Lexington, S.C., where being tough on crime comes with the territory. But another social undercurrent was also at work. "We found that in talking to citizens, nearly everyone had been touched by addiction and wanted to know if we were doing something that works, and if not, why not?" Fox recalled. MENTALLY ILL GET HELP

Judge Fritz Hany had presided over hundreds of domestic violence cases. But this one was different. An elderly man had been charged with assaulting a family member. As he stood before Hany during his arraignment in Ottawa County Municipal Court, it was obvious the man had some sort of mental issue. Later, Hany learned the man had begun to develop Alzheimer's disease, an incurable brain illness that causes loss of memory and affects thinking and behavior. IF YOU'RE ARRESTED FOR DRUGS, YOU'RE MORE LIKELY TO GET A SECOND CHANCE IF YOU'RE WHITE

Anthony Smith Jr. is black, poor and a native of Cleveland's East Side. So is Dontez Orr. Both are in their early 20s. Each had a life-altering encounter with police two summers ago that grew from trivial events. Smith was jaywalking on East 65th Street near Fleet Avenue; Orr was driving south on Interstate 71 at night with an unlighted rear license plate. Brian Biddulph is not a convicted felon, even though his offense was more serious and his record worse. Biddulph, who is white, listed a Westlake address and could afford to hire his own lawyer. He was given a second chance to remain felony-free. [More...](#)

IN CUYAHOGA COUNTY, YOU'RE MUCH MORE LIKELY TO GET A PLEA DEAL IF YOU'RE WHITE

Why did Kevin McFaul, white and the son of the county sheriff, get off with a misdemeanor conviction last year in his cocaine-possession case – potentially preserving his law license – while Mercia Cherry, a black resident of Cleveland's East Side, had to take a felony in hers? Especially considering that their offenses were roughly equivalent and McFaul's history was spottier. Why were white out-of-towners Richard Roby, Jason Haffa and Christopher Bonnacci sent home from the Cuyahoga County Justice Center with a misdemeanor slap on the wrist when all of them were caught with more illegal drugs than black visitor Marquita Brewer, who had to drag a felony record back home to Florida with her? NEW LAW MANDATES EQUITY FOR MENTAL ILLNESS

After twelve years of fighting to pass legislation to equalize mental health benefits with those for other diseases, advocates celebrated on Oct. 3 when President Bush signed the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act into law. The new law was added as an amendment to the \$700 billion rescue plan to boost the nation's economy and will improve benefits for up to 113 million people.

DRUG COURTS AT CENTER OF SENTENCING DEBATE

As the nation's inmate population climbs toward 2.5 million, the U.S. Sentencing Commission is considering alternatives to prison for some offenders, including treatment programs for nonviolent drug users and employment training for minor parole violators. The commission's consideration of alternatives to incarceration reflects its determination to persuade Congress to ease federal mandatory minimum sentencing laws that contributed to explosive growth in the prison population.

COURTS GIVE ADDICTS A CHANCE TO STRAIGHTEN OUT

It was not your usual courtroom scene. For one thing, the judge choked up as he described one woman's struggle with opiate addiction after her arrest for forging prescriptions. Over the last three years, she had repeatedly missed court-ordered therapy and hearings, and the judge, J. Wesley Saint Clair of the Drug Diversion Court, at first meted out mild punishments, like community service. But last winter, pushed past his forgiving limit, he jailed her briefly twice. SAMHSA AWARDS \$12 MILLION TO COMMUNITY TREATMENT AND SERVICE CENTERS HELPING CHILDREN SUFFERING FROM TRAUMATIC STRESS

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) today announced that \$12 million in total funding over the next four years will be provided through the National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative (NCTSI) to help communities meet the special needs of children at risk or suffering from traumatic stress. REHABILITATION OR CONVICTION FOR ADDICTED NURSES? THE COURTS MUST DECIDE

Should the first-time offender get treatment in lieu of conviction and an opportunity to return to her profession without a blot on her record? Or should she get a scarlet letter - a felony on her record - because her crime abused a position of trust? There is no obvious answer, because the Ohio appeals courts have issued differing rulings. That's why this issue belongs in the Ohio Supreme Court. Summit County Prosecutor Sherri Bevan Walsh is appealing nurse Sally Massien's treatment in lieu of conviction sentence to the 9th Ohio District Court of Appeals - and Walsh doesn't want it to end there. She hopes the case will be taken up by the Ohio Supreme Court. That's a good place for it. [More...](#)

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FREE MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING FOR JAIL AND COURT PERSONNEL

A core part of the National Alliance on Mental Illness of Ohio (NAMI Ohio) mission is to provide free training to dispel the myths about mental illness and to promote understanding. NAMI Ohio provides free one-day training for jail and court personnel who regularly encounter individuals with mental illness. Participants include parole, probation, corrections officers, public defenders, prosecutors, bailiffs, school personnel, and program coordinators who work with court involved youth. Attendees will learn to identify major mental illnesses and their typical characteristics; techniques to manage individuals with mental illness; how to better prevent crisis situations and how to handle them when they do occur; how to identify risk factors for suicide in correctional settings; about opportunities to expand court based jail diversion programs for individuals with mental illness. Attendees will also benefit from a presentation by an officer trained in Crisis Intervention Team training (a 40 hour academy providing de-escalation training for first responders). Ultimately, it is the goal of this training for participants to come away with a better understanding of what it might be like to have a mental illness.
